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# Operation Cane: Former Department of Home Affairs employee sentenced for unlawful access of information following ACLEI investigation

A former Department of Home Affairs employee was sentenced for unlawfully accessing restricted information at the Downing Centre Local Court in Sydney yesterday.

The former employee entered into a recognizance in the amount of \$500 on the condition that he be of good behaviour for a period of 12 months.

This matter was the result of an investigation by the Australian Commission for Law Enforcement Integrity (ACLEI) that found the offender, Emile Jaja unlawfully accessed information.

Mr Jaja was charged with accessing restricted data without authorisation between 2 June 2010 and 23 April 2020, pursuant to s 478.1(1) of the *Criminal Code* (Cth).

It was alleged Mr Jaja unlawfully accessed information about members of his local community known to him.

The Department of Home Affairs initially received information regarding Mr Jaja's alleged conduct and referred it to ACLEI. Mr Jaja formally resigned his employment with the Department in April 2021.

During the course of the investigation, ACLEI found that Mr Jaja's mother, Margaret Jaja, also a former employee of the Department of Home Affairs, had accessed information associated with her relatives, including her own file. Ms Jaja was convicted last week with recognizance order to be of good behaviour for 12 months. Ms Jaja formally resigned her employment with the Department in April 2021.

The Integrity Commissioner and head of ACLEI, Ms Jaala Hinchcliffe welcomed the findings, "Mr Jaja used his position to obtain restricted information without a valid reason."

"As the information was in relation to people known to him, it was clearly inappropriate for him to access this information and it constitutes an abuse of his position."

"This finding is a timely reminder to all Commonwealth employees of the importance of acting with the utmost integrity, particularly when it comes to the privileged access public servants have to personal information."
